Introduction

Welcome to the *Arran Bird Report for 2007*. This is the twenty-eighth consecutive annual bird report for the Isle of Arran and the second one compiled by me.

This report would not have been possible without the support and encouragement of a number of individuals whose input I would like to acknowledge publicly: Audrey Walters, the previous bird recorder, Terry Southall, our resident ringer, John Rhead, Andy Walker and Malcolm Whitmore for their local knowledge of raptors, and Bernie Zonfrillo, the bird recorder for the Clyde Area. The input of the local "volunteers" involved in the monthly shore bird count for the national Wetlands Bird Survey has been a valuable source of information. It has also been helpful to be given permission to access the Arran records submitted to BirdTrack, www.bto.org/birdtrack. At the writing stage, the advice of the committee of the Arran Natural History Society, and the editing and proof reading skills of Angela Cassels, Alan Hollick and Rod Smith were invaluable. Having said that, I accept full responsibility for all omissions and errors. My thanks also to the following photographers for giving me permission to use their images to illustrate the report: Arthur Duncan, Robert Lambie, Colin McCort, Carl Reavey and to Don Smith for his permission to use his Golden Eagle photograph for the front cover. Finally, there would be no report without the input of the contributors listed at the beginning.

Over the year I have been encouraged by the number of people, locals and visitors, who have contacted me by email, letter and phone. Some with one sighting; others, like a visitor, had over one hundred sightings in a week. All contacts have been welcome. I am not just interested in rare or unusual birds, but common birds, where there are significant numbers of common birds, which birds come to the garden at different times of the year, where breeding birds have been seen, when our summer or winter visitors have arrived or departed and what sightings have given individuals particular pleasure. I know that a number of people keep for their own interest all sorts of bird notes, and I would encourage these people to share this information with me, so that the basis of our annual Arran Bird Report can be as comprehensive as possible.

In 2007, over two hundred contributors submitted over three thousand records on one hundred and sixty species. Two are new to the Arran list, namely Ruddy Duck and Firecrest. These records have been distilled and I have tried to provide a readable Chronological Summary and a Systematic List that should provide a useful record of the bird life on Arran in 2007.

The Chronological Summary gives the highlights for each month. The Systematic List is in Voous order in line with the Clyde Report. For each species, as well as the common name, the (new) official name and its scientific name have been given. This is followed by a brief statement giving the status of each bird on Arran, which can be markedly different from the status of the same bird on the adjacent mainland.

Chronological Summary

January

The year 2006 ended with a severe storm on Hogmanay, and a Shag, a bird more associated with the coast, was found on high ground on the top of the String Road. This unsettled spell continued for the first three weeks of 2007 with more than 140mm of rain falling.

With such inclement weather, garden bird watching was to the fore. Sightings in gardens included a Waxwing in Lamlash on 8th. This colourful bird was later seen in Kingscross on 26th. Siskins visited Bailiemargaidh on 18th and later there was a group in Pirnmill on 29th. In Shiskine gardens there was a Yellowhammer on 19th, seven Long-tailed Tits also on 19th and a Reed Bunting on 23rd. On the 29th there were four pairs of Bullfinches in a garden in Strabane. In Kilpatrick, three Goldfinches on 30th were followed by a Redpoll on 31st. None of these bird appearances coincided with the RSPB "Big Garden Birdwatch" of the weekend of Saturday 27 and Sunday 28 January. It was almost as if they did not want to be counted!

Winter visitors included: four Purple Sandpipers at Kildonan on 5th; three Black-throated Divers in Whiting bay on 5th; a Rook on Levencorrach Farm on 6th; three hundred Greylag Geese between Sliddery and Lagg on 9th and similar number in the Shiskine Valley on 10th; two male and two female Goldeneye on Cleats Shore on 16th; four Great Northern Divers off Dippen on 21st; eighty Fieldfares with Redwings in Kilpatrick on 22nd and a Jack Snipe at Kildonan on 27th.

There were signs of approaching Spring with some song birds in full flow; a Gannet off Clauchlands on 1st; seven Fulmars on the cliffs at Cleiteadh Buidthe and an optimistic pair of Collared Doves nest building in Corriegills.

February

In February, the mild and generally wet spell of weather continued with the temperature falling below zero on only five days.

On the 27th two rare visitors were reported: a Great Crested Grebe in breeding plumage in Lamlash Bay and a Red Kite at Kingscross. There had been a similar report of a Red Kite from this area around this time the previous year.

Other reports included: thirty Bullfinches feeding on heather above Kilpatrick on 5th; a Great Spotted Woodpecker in Brodick Country Park on 8th; a Peregrine in Glen Rosa on 14th; four pairs of Goldeneye at Cordon on 15th; a pair of Golden Eagles over Beinn Bhreac on 18th; twenty-five Siskin in Glenashdale on the 25th; eight Pink-footed Geese with the Greylags in Shiskine on 26th; twenty seven Wigeon in Cosyden also on 26th and a dead Water Rail in Glenashdale on 28th.

All three divers were seen around the coast this month, including one Black-throat at Kilpatrick on 5th, one Great Northern at Catacol on 11th and two Red-throat at Auchenhew Bay on 25th.

Finally, some birds that used to be considered as only summer visitors were now over wintering. For example, there was a male Blackcap in a Brodick garden on 11th February and also on that date a Lesser Black–backed Gull on Kilpatrick shore.

March

In March the first half of the month was mild and wet and the second half was dry and bright, with winds mainly from the cold north and east. These winds may have delayed the arrival of our spring migrants. The first Wheatear was reported on 14 th March from Corriecravie ponds. This was followed on 25th by the first Sand Martin in Lamlash and on the same date the first Chiffchaff in Brodick Country Park. On 29th, a White Wagtail was reported from High Kildonan.

Other birds passing through on their way to their breeding grounds in the north included: a Bar-tailed Godwit at Machriewaterfoot on 24th; one hundred and ten Golden Plover at Machriewaterfoot on 29th; and three groups of flying Whooper Swans - seventy over Bennan Head on 24th, fifty-nine over Lamlash on 25th and thirty-two over Blackwaterfoot on 31st.

As well as this, some of our winter visitors were still around, including: a Rook at Knowe Farm on 5th; a group of Redwing in Shiskine on 17th; a single Fieldfare in Lamlash on 30th and twelve Wigeon at Machriewaterfoot on 29th.

Other sightings included: a Merlin at Glenashdale on 9th; a pair of Red Grouse above Monyquil Farm on 13th; a Golden Eagle carrying sticks in Glen Chalmadale on 14th; on 15th a pair of Crossbills feeding fledged young in Dyemill forest; a Twite at Clauchlands on 19th; a Short-eared Owl on the String road on 22nd; seven Linnet at Cleats Shore on 22nd; a Woodcock in Brodick Country Park on 25th and a female Goosander at Slidderywaterfoot on 26th.

April

April's weather was dominated by long dry spells with only a few days of rain. Initially the wind was mainly from the north and this may have delayed the arrival of our summer visitors. For example, in 2006 the first Swallow in Arran was reported on 27 th March. The first one this year was reported on 8 th April. However, as the temperature rose towards the end of the month, so the summer visitors began to arrive.

Other "firsts" for summer visitors were: on 11th Willow Warbler in Glen Righ; on 13th House Martin in Lamlash; on 14th Sandwich Tern in Kildonan, Whitethroat in Corriecravie and Blackcap in Glen Cloy; on 15th Whinchat in Machrie; on 18th Cuckoo in North Glen Sannox; on 21st Common Sandpiper at Port-na-Lochan; on 24th Manx Shearwater off Pladda; 26th Garden Warbler by the Goat Fell track through Brodick Country Park; 28th Wood Warbler in Merkland Wood; 29th Tree Pipit in Dyemill forest and 30th Grasshopper Warbler in Glen Righ and at Kilmory Farm.

Other birds passing through to breeding grounds further north included one Common Scoter off Largiemore on 5th; one Jack Snipe in Glen Righ on 10th; two Purple Sandpipers in Kildonan on 15th; one Whimbrel at the Iorsa mouth on 23rd and two male and two female Dotterel on the hills above Glen Sannox on 26th. This is the first report of this species since 1996.

An introduced species from North America, the Ruddy Duck, was reported from Port-na-Lochan on 21st. This is the first record on Arran. On 24th, at the gull roost by the mouth of the lorsa, an immature Iceland Gull was photographed. This is the first record since 2002.

May

May's weather was more unsettled than April's. Rain fell on over twenty days and, with the wind often from the north and east, temperatures could be low.

In May, the summer visitors continued to arrive with the following "firsts": Swift on 1st in Blackwaterfoot; Spotted Flycatcher on 1st in Castle Park field; Sedge Warbler on 2nd at Corriecravie; Lesser Whitethroat on 2nd at Auchenhew; Corncrake on 14th at Port-na-Lochan and Arctic Tern on 15th in Kildonan.

The date and place of the Corncrake was very similar to last year's report and again it only stayed for a few hours.

Another bird that did not stay was an Osprey. This bird was seen being mobbed by gulls as it flew above a group of people in their kayaks in Lamlash Bay on 13th.

Species who breed further north continued to pass through, including: three Whimbrels at Brodick on 15 May; four Purple Sandpipers at Drumadoon on 16th; a Knot at Blackwaterfoot on 19th; a Great Northern and a Black-throated Diver off Pirnmill on 21st; twenty-two Dunlin on the shore at Blackwaterfoot on 26th and seven Sanderling at Drumadoon on 31st.

Breeding for many species was well underway, including: young Siskin at feeders in High Kildonan on 6th; a Ringed Plover nest with four eggs at Sandbraes on 13th; twenty Fulmar pairs on the cliff at Drumadoon on 16th; a Dipper with two fledged young in Glenashdale on 27th; Long-tailed Tit feeding three young in Lamlash on 28th and a pair of Shelduck with twelve young on Cleats Shore on 30th. One of the factors determining success in breeding is the availability of food. A Short-eared Owl nest with eight eggs may reflect a good vole population this year, whereas dead House Martins by nest sites in Shiskine reflected a shortage of flying insects related to the cool weather.

A resident in Lochranza patiently waited for a pair of Pied Wagtails to raise their family. While the resident had been away for a few days, the birds had built a nest and laid five eggs inside the engine compartment of the family car!

June

After a cool May, June started with a warm settled spell, but this did not last.

The sighting of an Osprey in May was followed by another report of one over the Newton Shore on 8 June. Other reports in June included: a Great Skua off Lochranza on 5th; one hundred Manx Shearwaters west of Holy Isle on 10th; five Woodcocks roding over Brodick Country Park on 18th and eleven Teal on Torr Righ Beag on 29th.

In June, two of our less common summer visitors were first reported: a Redstart in Kildonan on 17th and two Common Terns at Blackwaterfoot on 27th. Interestingly the female Redstart, which had been caught and ringed, was in breeding condition with a brood patch.

Raising young is the priority during the long daylight hours in June. There were lots of reports of young birds, including: sixteen Long-tailed Tits in Whiting Bay on 6th; four cygnets at Port-na-Lochan on 11th; three Red-legged Partridge in Brodick Country Park on 12th; seven Red-breasted Merganser ducklings in Brodick Bay on 19th; two Kestrels at King's Cave on 19th; twenty Jackdaws at Dougarie on 25th and two Reed Buntings by the Ross Road on 27th. The five young Swallows on camera at the Rangers Centre were close to fledging on 28th.

On 20 June, there was an intriguing sighting of a pair of Rooks feeding two full grown young birds in a field in Shiskine. If they had bred on Arran this would have been a first, but they may have come from the mainland where there are rookeries in Ayrshire and Argyll, as well as on Bute and Cumbrae. The family did not linger, suggesting the latter is the more probable explanation.

Breeding can be hazardous. The high winds combined with high tides around 19 June wiped out many of the nests in the Common Gull colony at Dougarie.

On a more positive note, the Kilmory Hen Harriers on camera did extremely well this year. Four young have been successfully reared by devoted parents. By the end of June the young birds were only a few days away from taking flight. Many visitors to Kilmory Hall had been enthralled by the images of their progress during June and this success is a great credit to all involved with this innovative project.

July

July was drier than June, with a dry warm spell from 17th to 25th.

On 1 July, a Kingfisher was seen on Monamore Burn in Lamlash. This is an unusual summer sighting for Arran and was followed by another report of a Kingfisher on 13th at the Fisherman's Walk in Brodick. Other unusual summer sightings for Arran included: sixteen Rooks in Kilpatrick on 3rd and fifty-four Swifts in three flocks that followed the coast at Kildonan before heading across the sea to the mainland on 17th.

As in June, raising young continued to be a priority in July. Reports of breeding included: a female Bullfinch with five juveniles at Porta Leacach on 1st; a pair of Ringed Plover with five young in Kildonan on 1st; a small family group of Redpolls at Kilpatrick on 3rd; two young Barn Owls in a nest hole in Lamlash and one dead outside the nest on 5th; two young Spotted Flycatchers in a nest in Pirnmill on 7th; a group of eighteen Linnet including seven young at Corriecravie on 8th; a pair of Shelduck with six full grown young at Clauchlands on 25th; an immature Golden Eagle showing its white wing patches over Lochranza on 25th; a young rufous coloured Cuckoo with white neck patch on the Ross Road on 29th and after the five Swallows at Brodick Rangers Centre fledged, another four eggs were in the nest on 30th.

July marks the end of the breeding season for some birds. Some shore birds, which have been breeding further north, appeared again on their migration south including: a Whimbrel at Auchenhew on 3rd; a Dunlin with four Sanderlings at Blackwaterfoot on 16th; a Greenshank at Auchenhew on 23rd; fifteen Golden Plover at Machriewaterfoot on 27th; twenty-five Redshanks in Whiting Bay on 29th and a Turnstone in Blackwaterfoot on 30th.

Other observations received included: a Puffin from the Ardrossan ferry on 1st; a Longeared Owl calling in Kildonan on 9th; a Short-eared Owl over Machrie standing stones on 11th; eight Crossbills at Machrie forest on 17th; twelve Gannets in Brodick Bay on 19th; fourteen Black Guillemots by Kings Cave on 22nd and an Arctic Skua off Pladda on 26th.

Finally, on 15th July there was an interesting report of a Sparrowhawk hunting bats at dusk in Shiskine.

August

In August there was only one day where the temperature was more than twenty degrees centigrade. After the heavy rain around the 18th, the weather was a little more settled but with a hint of the approach of autumn.

Birding highlights this month included a number of sightings from the "Caledonian Isles". These included a Great Skua on the 8th, hundreds of Manx Shearwaters on 9th, an Arctic Skua on the 11th, a Great Northern Diver on the11th, and a Little Tern also on 11th. The Little Tern was the first one reported since 2005. On 8th and again on 11th, three Storm Petrels were reported. They breed in some of the smaller remote islands in the firth. They were last reported off Arran in 2004.

Other observations received included: twenty-four Canada Geese at the mouth of the Iorsa on 10th; a Red Kite in Dougarie also on 10th and a Merlin in Lochranza on 14th.

Summer visitors were still around, including: Chiffchaff in High Kildonan on 13th; Garden Warbler in Machrie on 15th; Whitethroat in Lamlash on 19th; and Spotted Flycatcher in Sliddery on 20th.

In August, breeding is coming to an end, and after breeding a number of species begin to flock together, some in preparation for migration. These included twenty-one Golden Plover at Machriewaterfoot on 21st; one hundred and seventy Kittiwake in Whiting Bay on 21st; and twenty-two Pied Wagtail near the Auchrannie on 26th.

Other birds starting on their migration included: five Dunlin with a Sanderling at Drumadoon on the 12th; two Whimbrel at Kilpatrick also on the 12th; and three Knot in Whiting Bay on 17th.

September

By the end of September migration was well underway. For example, on 30th, there were literally hundreds of birds making use of the fields at Drumadoon and Sliddery. These included large numbers of Skylark, Reed Bunting and Linnet, with smaller numbers of Twite and a few Wheatear and Yellowhammer. In Sliddery there are areas of unharvested crop of oats, kale, quinoa and red clover. Also, wholecrop silage of triticale and lupin mix have been used. These rely on the vigorous growing nature of both plants to compete with weeds, although there are some weeds such as redshank present. After harvesting there is quite a lot of triticale and weed seed left on the ground. This combination of the feed available in the unharvested crop areas along with the triticale and weed seed in the adjacent fields, together with substantial hedges around the fields, all contribute to attracting these large numbers of birds. All part of the farmers' interest in supporting wildlife.

Other birds on migration included: Bar-tailed Godwit at Blackwaterfoot on 20th; a female Merlin in Balegra on 23rd; two Redwing in South Newton on 30th and seven Black-throated Divers in Drumadoon Bay also on 30th.

With the approach of winter some birds move to the milder coast. On 22^{nd} there was a Little Grebe in Lochranza and Dipper were reported at the mouths of Glenashdale burn and the Blackwater on 28^{th} . Having said that, some summer visitors were still around including: Common Sandpiper at Kingscross on 16^{th} ; Sandwich Tern at Lochranza on 22^{nd} ; House Martin and Sand Martin in Sannox on 23^{rd} and a Swallow in Lamlash on 29^{th} .

Other sightings included: Arctic Skua in Whiting Bay on 13th; fifteen Teal on Torr Righ Beag on 27th; seventy Turnstone at Kildonan and twelve Wigeon at Cleats Shore on 28th and three hundred Kittiwake at Catacol on 29th.

After the report of the Red Kite in August, there were further sightings in September including east of Glenloig on 19th, Auchenhew on 28th and above Glenashdale on 30th.

October

October was warmer than normal with only a few unsettled days.

The latest reports for summer visitors were: twelve Manx Shearwaters from Ardrossan ferry on 7th; two Wheatears at Shiskine Golf Course on 15th; one Swallow in Kildonan on 21st and eight House Martins at Port-na-Lochan on 24th.

In October migration continued. Sightings included: two Bar-tailed Godwits at Kilpatrick on 7th; one Whimbrel at South Feorline on 13th and two Grey Plovers at Machriewaterfoot on 25th.

With the hedgerows almost red with haws and other berries, the wintering thrushes, the Redwings and Fieldfares, from the north had plenty to feed on. Hundreds were reported from various places including Kilpatrick on 17th; Kings Cross Point on 20th; Corrie on 20th and Lamlash on 21st. Most of these groups seemed to be passing through.

The first reports for some other winter visitors were: eight Whooper Swans at Pirnmill on 8th; one Brambling at High Kildonan on 9th; twenty-two Greylag Geese between Lagg and Sliddery on 12th and five Rooks in South Feorline on 18th.

Other sightings included: on 7th a Kingfisher at Fisherman's Walk Brodick and a thousand Kittiwake in Whiting Bay; on 8th fourteen Crossbills and a Great Spotted Woodpecker in Corriegills; on 20th two Little Grebe at Lochranza and on 24th thirty Twite in Blackwaterfoot and ten Black-throated Divers off Drumadoon.

November

During this month of unsettled weather, a number of scarce passage migrants and rare winter visitors were reported, including: Snow Bunting in Glen Catacol on 10th; seven Purple Sandpipers at Kildonan on 11th; Firecrest in Whiting Bay on 17th; Brambling in High Kildonan on 18th and on 24 October a Great Grey Shrike was with winter thrushes in Fairy Glen. The Firecrest is a first for Arran.

The first Shelduck report was from Clauchlands on 28th October and the first Goldeneye was from Cordon on 14th November.

Other sightings in November included: Ptarmigan on Beinn Bharrain on 1st; a mixed flock of two to three hundred Redwing and Fieldfare in Sliddery on 3rd; one hundred and sixty Golden Plover at Machriewaterfoot on 4th; two males and a female Yellowhammer in a Shiskine garden on 4th; one hundred and fifty Grey Lag Geese in the Shiskine Valley on 8th; one hundred and thirty Teal at Torr Righ Beag on 8th; one hundred and fifty Curlew at Corriecravie on 9th; two hundred Starling at South Feorline on 11th; eighty eight Turnstone also on 11th at Kildonan; twenty-three Bullfinches at Butter Hill on 12th; eighteen Blackbirds feeding around a seaweed mulch in a Kilmory garden on 13th; eight Rooks in Corriecravie on 18th; a male Mandarin Duck by Rosaburn Lodge on 21st and over fifty Linnets at Clauchlands on 26th.

December

During December, the unsettled weather continued that included a cold spell just before Christmas.

The Firecrest in Whiting Bay in November was followed by a report of a Yellow-browed Warbler on 4th December and again on 6th December. This species was last recorded in Arran in Kilmory on 11th December 1995.

Other winter visitors included: three Little Auks in Brodick Bay on 27th November; a Snow Bunting on Meall Breac on 3rd December; a Goldeneye on Sannox Burn on 4th; two Whooper Swans in Whiting Bay on 5th and three flying over Brodick Bay on 11th and a Barnacle Goose with Grey Lags at High Clachaig on 8th.

Other bird sightings in December included: a male Merlin at Machrie on 4th; a Kingfisher at the mouth of the Rosa burn on 11th; three pairs of Bullfinches on top of the hill near the Urie Loch on 13th; over one hundred Curlew in the field by the fire station in Lamlash on 16th; a sparring match between a Golden Eagle and a Peregrine Falcon at Garbh Allt on 18th and a small covey of Red Grouse to the west of Beinn Nuis also on 18th.

From the above summary, it has been an interesting birding year on Arran, including: the first reports of Dotterel since 1996; the innovative project, the Kilmory Hen Harriers on camera, fledging four young in July; over a thousand Kittiwakes in Whiting Bay in October; a Firecrest on 17th November, a first for the island; and there were a number of sightings of Red Kites dispersing from their release sites on the mainland. Also in the summer of 2007, there were reports of two species that used to be regular summer visitors to Arran: Nightjar and Corncrake. The reports were of long staying birds. This is the first report of Nightjar since 1998. Recent Corncrake reports have all been short staying birds. Both species were in areas where for the welfare of the bird, the landowners rightly wished no information be released. Let's hope this marks the beginning of the return of both species. Let's hope also that with the support of the landowners and Scottish National Heritage, measures will be taken that enable these species to thrive again on Arran.

Finally, 2007 saw the start of the re-introduction of Black Grouse on Arran with three pairs brought onto to the island to establish a breeding programme, from which in a few years it is planned to release birds into the wild. Red-throated Diver Gavia stellata

Breeding. Common round coast all year.

2 adults with one juvenile off Auchencar on 14 August; one adult and one juvenile in Whiting Bay on 15 September. Groups included 3 off Kilpatrick on 30 May and 5 off Largiebeg on 7 October.

Black-throated Diver Gavia arctica

Passage migrant with records from January to June and September to December 2007. Site of national importance for birds in autumn.

Groups included 5 in Machrie Bay on 16 May (some in breeding plumage), 7 off Drumadoon on 30 September, 5 in Whiting Bay on 15 October and 5 off Pirnmill on 18 December.

Great Northern Diver Gavia immer

Passage migrant. Records from January to May and August to December 2007.

Groups included 4 off Dippen on 21 January, 6 in Drumadoon Bay 24 March, 6 in Kilbrannan Sound on 6 April and 6 in Machrie Bay on 26 April.

Little Grebe Tachybaptus ruficollis

Overwinters.

Two on Cloy/Rosa burns by Brodick Golf Course on 14 January, one Port-na-Lochan from 30 January to 2 March and 2 at Lochranza on 20 October. Singles in Lochranza on 4 January, 10 October, 16 November and 17 December.

Great Crested Grebe Podiceps cristatus

Occasional winter and passage migrant.

One Lamlash Bay in breeding plumage on 27 February and one in Lamlash Bay on 1 March. These are all the records for 2007.

Red-necked Grebe Podiceps grisegena

Occasional winter and passage migrant.

No records for 2007. Last record was one Whiting Bay 23-24 October 2006.

Slavonian Grebe Podiceps auritus

Occasional winter and passage migrant.

One Drumadoon Bay 24 October. (JA)

Black-necked Grebe Podiceps nigricollis

Occasional winter and passage migrant.

No records for 2007. Last record was one Whiting Bay 15 December 2003.

Fulmar (Northern Fulmar) Fulmarus glacialis

Breeding. Common round coast all year.

Nest areas included 7 pairs Cleiteadh Buidhe 29 January, 11 Dun Fionn 14 March, 24 Drumadoon 16 May and 11 Kildonan 17 June. There were no reports of fledged young.

Cory's Shearwater Calonectris diomedea

Rare vagrant.

No records for 2007. Last record was one off Porta Leacach 18 January 1997.

Sooty Shearwater Puffinus griseus

Rare vagrant.

No records for 2007. Last record was one off Largymore 24 August 1996.

Manx Shearwater Puffinus puffinus

Passage migrant with records from 24 April to 27 October.

Large groups included over 100 off Pladda on 10 June, 20 passing Kildonan in half an hour on 26 July and over 100 from Ardrossan ferry on 11 August.

Mediterranean Shearwater (Balearic Shearwater) *Puffinus mauretanicus Rare vagrant*.

No records for 2007. Last record was one off Corriecravie 14 October 1990.



Storm Petrel (European Storm Petrel) Hydrobates pelagicus

Rare vagrant.

One 20 May, one 14 July, 3 on 8 August and again on 11 August. All from the Ardrossan ferry. These are all the records for 2007.

Leach's Petrel (Leach's Storm Petrel) *Oceanodroma leucorhoa Rare vagrant*.

No records for 2007. Last record was one off Pirnmill 24 September 1991.

Gannet (Northern Gannet) Morus bassanus

Nearest breeding colony Ailsa Craig. Round coast all year but much more common in summer with records from 1 January to 4 November.

Groups included 30 off Pirnmill 11 March, 65 passing Kildonan in half an hour on 25 July, over 80 from Ardrossan ferry on 11 August and 54 in Brodick Bay on 15 August.

Cormorant (Great Cormorant) Phalacrocorax carbo

No breeding records. Common round coast all year but less common than Shag.

Groups included 12 Corriecravie shore 22 January, 13 Dougarie 12 August and 14 Kildonan on 7 October.

Shag (European Shag) Phalacrocorax aristotelis

Breeding. Common round coast all year.

Nest area on Pladda 17 July 70-80 pairs and good numbers of young. Groups included 43 Corriecravie shore 22 January, 74 Blackwaterfoot on 15 May, 54 in Whiting Bay on 29 June and 89 Lamlash on 16 September.

Bittern Botaurus stellaris

Rare vagrant.

No records for 2007. Last record was a dead one found in Shiskine on 10 March 1996.

Snowy Egret Egretta thula

One record of this American species.

It was recorded over the winter of 2001-02 mainly in the Cloy/Rosa burn area. Last record was on 28 March 2002 at Carlo/Corrie.

Grey Heron Ardea cinerea

Breeding. Common round coast all year.

Nest areas in 2007 included 3 at Whitehouse Lamlash on 28 March and one at Lagg on 1 May. Groups included 4 at Lochranza on 16 June, 4 Pirnmill on 3 September, 4 Whiting Bay on 4 September and 3 Clauchlands on 25 September.

Spoonbill (Eurasian Spoonbill) Platalea leucorodia

Rare vagrant.

No records for 2007. Last record was one at Corrie on 13 October 1978.

Mute Swan Cygnus olor

Breeding. Common round coast all year.

Pairs with young included 4 young at Port-na-Lochan and 5 young Sannox on 11 June. In August there were pairs with one young at Blackwaterfoot on 11th, at Corrie on 12th, at Catacol on 13th, and a pair with two young at Machrie on 14th. Winter groups included 10 adults and 3 juveniles at Whiting Bay on 1 January.

Bewick's Swan (Tundra Swan) Cygnus columbianus

Rare winter visitor.

No records for 2007. Last record was one at Lagg 6 January 1991.

Whooper Swan Cygnus cygnus

Winter visitor and passage migrant.

Up to 4 adults in Whiting Bay between 1 January and 13 April. Also in Whiting Bay there were 2 on 24 October, 2 on 11 November and 3 on 20 December. Passage groups included 70 over Bennan Head on 24 March, 59 in Lamlash Bay on 25 March and 14 in Machrie Bay on 23 October.

Pink-footed Goose Anser brachyrhynchus

Winter visitor and passage migrant.

Five with Greylags in Shiskine Valley on 18 February increased to 22 by 19 March.

White-fronted Goose (Greater White-fronted Goose) Anser albifrons

Occasional winter visitor.

No records for 2007. Last record was one bird with identification collar with Greylags in Shiskine Valley on 4 March 2006.

Greylag Goose Anser anser

Winter visitor

Up to 400 in Shiskine Valley between 1 January and 1 April. Up to 300 in fields Sliddery and Lagg from 31 October to 12 December. 65 on Cleats Shore on 5 April.

Canada Goose Branta canadensis

Occasional visitor.

Seven over Braehead quarry on 31 May and 24 at the mouth of the lorsa on 10 August. These are all the records for 2007.

Barnacle Goose Branta leucopsis.

Occasional winter visitor.

One with Greylags at High Clachaig on 25 November and again on 8 December. These are all the records for 2007.

Brent Goose Branta bernicla

Occasional winter visitor.

No records for 2007. Last record 16 in Brodick Bay on 6 October 2005.

Shelduck (Common Shelduck) Tadorna tadorna

Breeding. Common round coast from January to July and November to December.

Pairs with various numbers of young included: 11 young at Clauchlands on 13 May, 8 at Carlo on 15 May, 10 on Cleats Shore on 25 June and 6 at Clauchlands on 25 July.

Mandarin Aix galericulata

Introduced species which has bred regularly at Loch Eck, Cowal, Argyll in recent vears.

Male in Rosa and Cloy burns by Brodick Golf course from 13 April to 10 June.

Wigeon Anas penelope

Winter visitor with records from January to March and September to December.

Groups included 24 at Cosyden on 21 January, 15 at Auchenhew Bay on 25 January, 35 at Machrie on 11 November, 11 at Kildonan on 11 November and 3 at Clauchlands on 9 December.

Teal (Common Teal) Anas crecca

Breeding and winter visitor. Common round coast from January to April and September to December.

Groups included 80 on Kilpatrick shore on 5 February, 17 on pond in Kilpatrick plantation on 27 March and 120 on Torr Righ Beag from 18 October to 8 November.

Mallard Anas platyrhynchos

Breeding. Common round coast all year.

Females with young included 12 on Machrie pond on 14 April, 3 on Shiskine pond on 21 April, and 3 by Fisherman's Walk, Brodick on 22 June. Groups included 58 in Brodick Bay on 21 January and 100 on Kilpatrick shore on 19 November.

Pintail (Northern Pintail) Anas acuta

Rare vagrant.

No records for 2007. Last record one on Machrie pond on 14 August 1994.

Shoveler (Northern Shoveler) Anas clypeata

Rare vagrant.

No records for 2007. Last record 2 males at Machrie on 18 August 1996.

Pochard (Common Pochard) Aythya ferina

Rare vagrant.

No records for 2007. Last record one in Lamlash on 21 March 1984.

Tufted Duck Aythya fuligula

Occasional visitor.

No records for 2007. Last record one male on Port-na-Lochan from 21 April to 4 May 2006.

Scaup (Greater Scaup) Aythya marila

Occasional winter visitor.

No records for 2007. Last record a pair on Port-na-Lochan on 2 January 2003.

Eider (Common Eider) Somateria mollissima

Breeding. Common round coast all year.

Breeding included 6 females with 6 young at Pirnmill on 10 June, and one female with one young Torrylinn on 14 July. Groups included 21 Catacol on 22 January, 24 Lamlash on 13 May, 27 Kings Cave on 27 September and 50 in Whiting Bay on 11 November.

King Eider Somateria spectabilis

Rare vagrant.

No records for 2007. Last record was a long staying drake in Lochranza with no records after 26 April 1980.

Long-tailed Duck Clangula hyemalis

Rare vagrant.

No records for 2007. Last record one in Blackwaterfoot on 27 April 1998.

Common Scoter (Black Scoter) Melanitta nigra

Occasional visitor.

One male off Largymore on 5 April was the only record in 2007. (MG)

Velvet Scoter Melanitta fusca

Rare vagrant.

No records for 2007. Last record 2 off Catacol on 5 April 1998.

Goldeneye (Common Goldeneye) Bucephala clangula

Winter visitor with records from January to April and November to December.

Groups included 4 at Cleats Shore on 16 January and 8 off Cordon on 15 February. Latest spring record a male off Kilpatrick shore on 8 April and first autumn record a pair off Cordon on 14 November.

Smew Mergellus albellus

Occasional winter visitor.

No records for 2007. Last record a male off Pirnmill on 28 November 2004.

Red-breasted Merganser Mergus serrator

Breeding. Common round coast all year. Site of national importance.

Female with 5 young in Machrie and female with 3 young Creag Dubh on 16 July. Groups included 130 at Machrie on 2 July and 40 at Pirnmill on 12 July.

Goosander Mergus merganser

Breeding, 2006 was first breeding record since 2003.

No confirmed breeding in 2007. Sightings included a male in Lochranza on 2 January, a pair at Machriewaterfoot on 14 April, a pair at Auchencar on 25 April and 3 males at Kilmory on 17 May.

Ruddy Duck Oxyura jamaicencis

Introduced species which first bred in Ayrshire in 2001.

Male on Port-na-Lochan on 21 April (GB).



Red Kite Milvus milvus

Occasional Visitor.

Singles seen included Knowe Farm on 27 February, Dougarie on 10 August, Glenloig on 19 September and Auchenhew on 28 September..

Marsh Harrier (Eurasian Marsh Harrier) *Circus aeruginosus Rare vagrant*.

No records for 2007. Last record was a juvenile in Lamlash 19 August 2004.

Hen Harrier Circus cyaneus

Resident. Breeding widespread. Internationally important area with five percent of UK breeding population.

Breeding season better than 2006 with a minimum of 44 chicks fledged including 4 on camera in Kilmory in July. Numerous widespread sightings including male in Kilpatrick on 8 March, a pair on Machrie moor on 21 March, a male in Glen Chalmadale on 25 April, a pair on Glenshant Hill on 21 June and a pair on the Ross Road on 9 November.

Goshawk (Northern Goshawk) Accipiter gentilis

No confirmed breeding.

Singles recorded High Kildonan on 21 March, a juvenile in Corriecravie on 26 August, Cleats Shore on 28 October and Monamore Glen on 14 November. These are all the records for 2007.

Sparrowhawk (Eurasian Sparrowhawk) *Accipiter nisus*

Resident. Breeding widespread.

Poorer breeding season than 2006 with 13 young fledged from 8 successful nests within 11 territories studied. Crossbill remains found at 1 plucking post. Numerous sightings throughout the year including one hunting bats in Shiskine on 15 July.

Buzzard (Common Buzzard) Buteo buteo

Resident. Breeding widespread.

Numerous sightings throughout the year including 5 over Ross Road on 14 July, 4 over Machrie Moor on 11 August and 5 in Pirnmill on 12 August.

Rough-legged buzzard Buteo lagopus

Rare vagrant.

No records for 2007. Last recorded Cleats Shore 10 November 1974.

White-tailed eagle Haliaeetus albicilla Rare vagrant.

No records for 2007. Last record was an adult over Sandbraes flying towards Holy Isle on 18 March 2006.

Golden Eagle Aquila chrysaetos

Resident. Breeding.

All territories occupied. Three young fledged.

Sightings included a pair on Beinn Bhreac on 18 February, a pair in Glen Chalmadale on 14 March, 3 circling Cir Mhor on 20 March, one immature over Lochranza on 27 October and one immature in Glen Rosa on 3 November.

Osprey Pandion haliaetus

Occasional passage migrant.

Singles recorded in Lamlash Bay on 13 May and over north Newton Shore on 8 June. These are all the records for 2007.

Kestrel (Common Kestrel) Falco tinnunculus

Resident. Breeding widespread.

Numerous sightings throughout the year including a pair in Glen Chalmadale on 25 April, a family of 4 by the Kings Cave on 29 June, a family of 4 at Brown Head on 2 August and 3 in Glen Catacol on 17 December.

Merlin Falco columbarius

No confirmed breeding, possibly underreported. More widely distributed in winter and on passage.

Singles recorded included a female at the Dyemill on 15 January, a male over Glenashdale shore on 9 March, a male in Monamore Glen on 24 May, a female over Cleats Shore on 21 September and a male at Machrie on 4 December.

Hobby (Eurasian Hobby) Falco subbuteo

Rare vagrant.

No records for 2007. Last recorded Largiemore on 24 May 2002.

Peregrine Falco peregrinus

Resident. Breeding widespread at inland and coastal sites.

All territories occupied. Five young fledged. Numerous sightings throughout the year including. male Whiting Bay 3 January, one stooping on a Raven at Cioch nah-Oige on 28 April, a pair Beinn Nuis on 7 July, two young pursuing Sandwich Terns on 12 August, a juvenile on Cleats shore on 28 September and one mobbing a Golden Eagle by Garbh Allt on 18 December.

Red Grouse (Willow Ptarmigan) Lagopus scoticus

Resident. Breeding. Underreported.

Ten Glen Righ 30 April. Pair with 6 young north west of Loch Tanna 6 June. Three by Loch na Leirg 20 November .

Ptarmigan Lagopus mutus

Very localised.

Two Beinn Bharrain on 1 November (TL).



Black Grouse Tetrao tetrix

Previously bred.

No records for 2007. Last record a female in High Glen Cloy on 18 February 2000. Re-introduction programme started.

Red-legged Partridge Alectoris rufa

Introduced species.

Groups included, 6 Balmichael estate on 23 February, 3 Balnacoole on 1 March and a pair with three young in Brodick Country Park on 12 June.

Grey Partridge *Perdix perdix*

Previously bred.

No records for 2007. Last record, excluding released birds in the 1990s, was 4 at Clauchlands on 15 November 1989.

Quail (Common Quail) Coturnix coturnix

Previously bred.

No records for 2007. Last record one in Kilpatrick plantation on 30 May 1995.

Pheasant (Common Pheasant) Phasianus colchicus

Introduced species. Long-established, widespread, and common resident breeding bird.

Reports from all areas including two leucistic birds in Shiskine valley.

Water Rail Rallus aquaticus

Localised Resident. Breeding,

One found dead 28 February in Glenashdale. Three young reared Kings Cross area with 3 birds still in this area in December. These are all the records for 2007.

Spotted Crake Porzana Porzana

One historical record.

One found dead by Pladda lighthouse on 24 October 1895.

Corncrake Crex crex

Rare summer visitor. Previously bred.

One calling Port-na-Lochan on 14 May is the only record in the public domain. (GH)

Moorhen (Common Moorhen) Gallinula chloropus

Localised resident. Breeding.

One juvenile on Port-na-Lochan pond from 4 January to 14 March. One Machrie pond on 18 March. Two Corriecravie pond on 8 July. Two Port-na-Lochan 17 November.

Coot (Common Coot) Fulica atra

Occasional visitor.

No records for 2007. Last record one Machrie pond on 21 April 2002.

Crane (Grus grus)

Rare vagrant.

No records for 2007. Last record 2 in Shiskine valley on 26 September 1989.

Oystercatcher (Eurasian Oystercatcher) *Haematopus ostralegus*

Resident. Breeding. Common round coast all year.

Nests recorded Kilpatrick, Dougarie, Machrie, Clauchlands, Sandbraes, Cleats Shore, Kildonan, Pladda.

Groups included 150 at Machriewaterfoot on 20 January, 130 at Clauchlands on 21 January, 120 on Sliddery shore on 26 January and 130 at Kildonan on 9 December.

Ringed Plover Charadrius hiaticula

Resident. Breeding. Common round coast all year.

Nests recorded Kilpatrick, Dougarie, Machrie, Kilmory, Clauchlands, Sandbraes, Cleats Shore, Kildonan.

Groups included 52 in Whiting Bay on 5 January, 63 in Blackwaterfoot on 12 August, 70 Porta Leach, Kildonan, on 15 August and 42 at Clauchlands on 11 November.

Golden Plover (European Golden Plover) Pluvialis apricaria

Breeding and winter visitor. Common Machrie shore from January to April and August to December.

Five successful territories in north western moorland. Groups at Machriewaterfoot included 110 on 29 March and 165 on 24 October.



Dotterel Charadrius morinellus

Uncommon passage migrant.

Two males and two females on Mullach Buidhe on 26 April (JH).

Grey Plover (*Pluvialis squatarola*)

Uncommon passage migrant.

Two at Machriewaterfoot on 25 October (JWil).

Lapwing (Northern Lapwing) Vanellus vanellus

Breeding and winter visitor.

No confirmed breeding records. Groups included 41 Kilpatrick on 21 January, 97 at Port na Feannaiche on 22 January, 51 Corriecravie shore on 18 November and 15 in Lamlash on 9 December.

Knot (Red Knot) Calidris canutus

Passage migrant.

One at Blackwaterfoot on 19 May, 3 in Whiting Bay on 17 August, one at Drumadoon on 23 August and 2 on Cleats Shore on 9 September. These are all the records for 2007.

Sanderling Calidris alba

Passage migrant.

Groups included 2 Blackwaterfoot on 13 May, 7 Drumadoon on 31 May, 4 Blackwaterfoot on 16 July and 2 South Feorline on 24 September.

Little Stint Calidris minuta

Uncommon passage migrant.

No records for 2007. Last record 3 Machriewaterfoot on 8 September 2002.

Curlew Sandpiper Calidris ferruginea

Uncommon passage migrant.

No records for 2007. Last record one on Kildonan shore on 27 August 2006.

Purple Sandpiper Calidris maritima

Winter visitor.

Groups included 4 Kildonan on 5 January, 4 Drumadoon on 16 May and 10 Kildonan on 9 December.

Dunlin Calidris alpina

Passage migrant with records from most months of the year. No breeding records.

Groups included 11 Drumadoon on 16 May, 9 Kildonan on 15 July, 12 Brodick on 10 August and 20 Kilpatrick on 19 November.

Ruff Philomachus pugnax

Uncommon passage migrant.

No records for 2007. Last record 2 Kildonan on 26 August 1987.

Jack Snipe Lymnocryptes minimus

Uncommon winter visitor.

One Kildonan on 27 January and one Glen Righ on 10 April. These are all the records for 2007.

Snipe Gallinago gallinago

Resident but underreported breeder.

No breeding records. Groups included 2 Glen Easburg on 7 April, one Glen Righ on 30 April, 5 Kildonan on 10 September and 3 Balnagowan farm on 27 December.

Long-billed Dowitcher Limnodromus scolopaeceus

One record of this American species.

One juvenile was at Slidderywaterfoot from 15 to 17 September 1990.

Woodcock (Eurasian Woodcock) Scolopax rusticola

Resident but underreported breeder.

No breeding records. Pairs flying at dusk at Lagg on 20 May, Machrie on 24 May, Knockenkelly on 17 June, Brodick Country Park on 20 June and over the Dyemill on 27 November.

Black-tailed Godwit Limosa limosa

Uncommon passage migrant.

No records for 2007. Last record one at Kildonan on 27 September 2005.

Bar-tailed Godwit Limosa Iapponica

Uncommon passage migrant.

One Machriewaterfoot on 24 March, one Blackwaterfoot on 20 September, one Cleats Shore on 22 September and 2 Kilpatrick shore on 7 October. These are all the records for 2007.

Whimbrel Numenius phaeopus

Passage migrant and occasional winter visitor.

Groups included 5 at Auchenhew bay on 3 May, 4 Blackwaterfoot on 4 May, 6 Auchenhew bay on 23 July and 3 Kilpatrick on 26 August.

Curlew (Eurasian Curlew) Numenius arquata

Resident but unreported breeder.

No breeding records. Short billed young birds in group of 56 on Porta Leacach, Kildonan, on 23 July. Other groups included 38 Dougarie on 21 January, 188 Corriecravie on 22 January, 106 Port na Feannaiche on 27 January, 54 Machrie on 25 October and 100 in Lamlash on 16 December.

Spotted Redshank Tringa erthropus

Uncommon passage migrant.

No records for 2007. Last record one at Lamlash on 21 August 2004.

Redshank (Common Redshank) Tringa totanus

Passage migrant with records from most months of the year. No breeding records.

Groups included 9 at Kildonan on 6 January, 12 at Torrylinn on 26 January, 8 at Lochranza on 9 August and 33 at Sandbraes, Whiting Bay on 2 September.

Greenshank (Common Greenshank) Tringa nebularia

Uncommon passage migrant.

One Porta Leach on 23 July and 2 Cleats Shore on 19 August. These are all the records for 2007.

Green Sandpiper (*Tringa ochropus*)

Uncommon passage migrant.

No records for 2007. Last record one at Kildonan on 1 August 2003.

Common Sandpiper *Actitis hypoleucos*

Summer visitor with records from April to August. Breeding.

Pairs with 2 young at Drumadoon on 10 June, 2 young at Fallen Rocks on 27 June, 3 young Machrie on 3 July and 3 young on South Feorline shore on 5 August.

Turnstone (Ruddy Turnstone) *Arenaria interpres*

Passage migrant with records from most months of the year.

Groups included 20 in South Feorline on 21 January, 39 in Machrie on 15 April, 28 in Whiting Bay on 29 October and 90 in Kildonan on 9 December

Red-necked Phalarope Phalaropus lobatus

Rare vagrant.

No records for 2007. Last record 2 in Wineport area of Brodick bay on 28 August 1983.

Grey Phalarope Phalaropus fulicarius

Rare vagrant.

No records for 2007. Last record one in Brodick bay on 23 March 1989.

Pomarine Skua Stercorarius pomarinus

Uncommon passage migrant.

No records for 2007. Last record one off Pirnmill on 3 October 1991.

Arctic Skua Stercorarius parasiticus

Uncommon passage migrant.

One from Ardrossan ferry on 19 May, one off Pladda on 26 July, one from Ardrossan ferry on 11 August and one in Whiting Bay on 13 September. These are all the records for 2007.

Great Skua Stercorarius skua.

Uncommon passage migrant.

Two from Ardrossan ferry on 20 May, 3 north of Lochranza on 5 June and one from Ardrossan ferry on 8 August. These are all the records for 2007.

Mediterranean Gull Larus melanocephalus

Rare vagrant.

No records for 2007. Last record one at Catacol on 30 December 1992.

Little Gull Larus minutus

Uncommon irregular visitor.

No records for 2007. Last record one in Whiting Bay on 27 June 2005.

Black-headed Gull Larus ridibundus

Non breeding. Present round coast most of the year.

Groups included 11 at Clauchlands on 1 January, 24 in Whiting Bay on 28 February and 6 on Kilpatrick shore on 11 November.

Common Gull (Mew Gull) Larus canus

Breeding. Common round coast all year.

Between 50 and 55 nests at Dougarie on 5 June, many later destroyed by high tide. Groups included 198 in Lamlash on 19 March, and on 11 November 287 on Kilpatrick shore and 146 in Lamlash.

Lesser Black-backed Gull Larus fuscus

Breeding. Common round coast from February to October.

Two hundred plus pairs with some flying young on Pladda on 17 July. Other groups included 52 at Cordon on 14 March, 58 at mouth of lorsa on 26 June, 114 in Whiting Bay on 12 August and 40 in Machrie on 15 August.

Herring Gull Larus argentatus

Breeding. Common round coast all year.

Groups included 496 in Sannox bay on 23 May, 245 in Whiting Bay on 12 August and 241 on Kilpatrick shore on 11 November.

Iceland Gull Larus glaucoides

Uncommon winter visitor.

First winter gull at mouth of lorsa on 24 April (SDH). This is the only record for 2007.

Glaucous Gull Larus hyperboreus

Uncommon winter visitor.

No records for 2007. Last record was in 2006. That year, a bird in first winter plumage was first reported north of Pirnmill on 8 March. On the 12 March it was in Whiting Bay. On 23 March it was in Lamlash. Last reported 30 March Whiting Bay.

Great Black-backed Gull Larus marinus

Breeding. Common round coast all year.

Six pairs on Pladda on 26 June. Two fledged young at mouth of lorsa on 6 August. Groups included 25 at Catcacol on 29 September and 14 at Kilpatrick on 11 November.

Sabine's Gull Larus sabini

Uncommon passage migrant.

No records for 2007. Last record one in Brodick Bay on 31 December 1994.

Kittiwake (Black-legged Kittiwake) Rissa tridactyla

Nearest breeding colony Ailsa Craig. Round coast all year.

Groups included 300 in Kildonan on 4 June, 170 in Whiting Bay on 21 August, 300 off Lochranza on 22 September, over 1,000 in Whiting Bay on 11 November and 290 in Whiting Bay on 11 November.

Ivory Gull Pagophila eburnea

One historical record.

One shot in Lamlash bay in 1895. There was one at Greanan near Ayr on the Ayrshire coast from 13 December 2006 to 3 January 2007.

Ross's Gull Rhodostethia rosea

Rare vagrant.

No records for 2007. Last record one at Kildonan on 21 November 1995.

Black Tern Chlidonias niger

Uncommon passage migrant.

No records for 2007. Last record one Pirnmill on 12 September 1992.

Roseate Tern Sterna dougallii

Rare summer visitor.

No records for 2007. Last record 2 at Dougarie on 5 May 1984.

Common Tern Sterna hirundo

Uncommon summer visitor.

Two in Blackwaterfoot on 27 June and one in the same area on 27 July. These are all the records for 2007.

Arctic Tern Sterna paradisaea

Summer visitor. Breeding.

On Pladda 10-15 pairs on 1 June. Other sightings included 7 in Kildonan on 15 May, 20 on Pladda on 10 June and one in Whiting Bay on 26 June.

Little Tern Sterna albifrons

Uncommon summer visitor.

One in Brodick bay on 11 August (MMcG). This is the only record for 2007.

Sandwich Tern Sterna sandvicencis

Summer visitor. Non breeding.

Groups included 7 in Machrie Bay on 23 April, 4 in Blackwaterfoot on 1 July, 8 in Whiting Bay on 12 August, and 5 in Cleats Shore on 24 September.

Little Auk Alle alle

Scarce and irregular winter visitor, usually seen after severe gales.

Three in Brodick bay on 25 November (CTay). This is the only record for 2007.

Razorbill Alca torda

Nearest breeding colony Ailsa Craig. Round coast all year but more sightings in summer.

Groups included 60 off Pirnmill on 18 January, 14 in Kildonan on 21 January, 8 in Whiting Bay on 24 April and 25 in Porta Leacach on 6 October.

Guillemot (Common Guillemot) Uria aalge

Nearest breeding colony Ailsa Craig. Round coast all year but more sightings in summer.

Groups included over 200 off Lochranza on 22 September and over 500 off Pirnmill on 25 December.



Black Guillemot Cepphus grylle

Breeding. Round coast all year.

Two nests Kilpatrick on 24 April, 3 nests Brodick pier on 18 May, and 3 nests Imachar on 14 July. Other groups included 14 off Kings Caves on 22 July, 13 off Pirnmill on 9 August and 6 in Whiting Bay on 4 September.

Puffin (Atlantic Puffin) Fratercula arctica

Nearest breeding colony Ailsa Craig. Round coast all year but more sightings in summer.

One seen between Pladda and Kildonan on 26 April. Other singles seen from the Ardrossan ferry on 26 April, 22 May, 1 July and the body of one bird was on the shore at Sannox on 2 July. These are all the records for 2007.

Pallas's Sandgrouse Syrrhaptes paradoxus

One historical record.

One mention in one source of being present in Arran during the irruption from Asia to Western Europe in 1888. No further details.

Rock Dove Columba livia

Resident. Breeding.

Groups included 5 Cleiteadh Buidhe on 20 January, 62 Auchencar on 11 August and 19 at Brown Head on 14 November.

Stock Dove Columba oenas

Very scarce.

No records for 2007. Last record one on footpath to Fallen Rocks on 14 June 1989.

Woodpigeon (Common Woodpigeon) Columba palumbus

Resident. Breeding.

Groups included 12 in Whiting Bay on 28 February, 52 in High Kildonan on 2 April and 25 in Sannox on 23 October.

Collared Dove (Eurasian Collared Dove) Streptopelia decaocto

Resident. Breeding.

Present around all villages. Groups included 14 in Blackwaterfoot on 11 August and 16 in Brodick on 23 October.

Turtle Dove Streptopelia turtur

Occasional Visitor.

No records for 2007. Last record was one with a group of Collared Doves in Brodick from 25 October to 8 November 2006.

Cuckoo (Common Cuckoo) Cuculus canorus

Summer visitor. Breeding. Widespread.

First one reported calling in North Glen Sannox on 18 April. Later reports from around the island. The last one, a rufous juvenile, was reported on 29 July by the Ross Road.

Barn Owl Tyto alba

Resident. Breeding. Widespread.

Most territories occupied: at least 12 pairs raised young, with a replacement brood of youngsters still in the nest in September. Sightings from Balmichael, Corrie, Brodick Dougarie, Kilmory, Lamlash, Lochranza, Ross Road, Shiskine, String, and Whiting Bay.

Tawny Owl Strix aluco

Only records are from one long lived introduced bird in Brodick Country Park.

Long-eared Owl Asio otus

Resident possibly underreported. Breeding.

Pair nesting forest area of Ross Road and unusually a ground nesting pair in Machrie. Other reports included a calling bird in Kildonan on 18 June and again during the week of 9 July.

Short-eared Owl Asio flammeus

Resident. Breeding.

Poor year. Only one breeding record – a nest with 8 eggs top of the String on 27 April. Other sightings included 4 Glen Righ on 30 April, singles on Machrie moor between 15 May and 28 May, single Glenshant Hill on 21 June and a pair on Beinn Bhreac on 2 September.

Nightjar Caprimulgus europaeus

Summer visitor, Previously bred.

No records in the public domain in 2007. Last record Maol Donn on 24 May 1998.

Swift (Common Swift) Apus apus

Summer visitor and passage migrant. No breeding records. Reports from May to August.

Groups included 6 over High Kildonan on 9 July, 54 in three groups at Porta Leacach on 17 July and two at Clauchlands on 12 August.

Kingfisher (Common Kingfisher) Alcedo atthis

Resident. No confirmed breeding.

Singles by Monamore burn on 1 July, on Blackwaterfoot shore on 18 October, by Port-na-Lochan pond 24 October and by Fisherman's Walk, Brodick 26 January, 13 July, 7 October, 3 November and 11 December.

Hoopoe Upupa epops

Vagrant.

No records for 2007. Last record was one photographed in a garden in Thunderguy on 25 June 2006.

Great Spotted Woodpecker *Dendrocopos major*

Resident. Breeding. Localised.

Regularly seen at feeders by nature centre in Brodick Country Park and heard drumming in Merkland Wood from January to April. Also one Glen Rosa on 1 April, one Corriegills on 8 October and one by Rosa bridge on String Road on 26 November.

Wryneck Jynx torquilla

Uncommon passage migrant.

No records for 2007. Last record in Sannox on 25 September 1997.

Skylark (Sky Lark) Alauda arvensis

Resident with increased numbers in winter. Breeding.

Breeding territories occupied in Machrie, Kilpatrick, Drumadoon, Torrylinn, and Sannox. Groups included 5 Kildonan 18 February, 120 on Cleats Shore on 21 September and between 80 and 100 on Drumadoon Farm on 30 September.

Sand Martin Riparia riparia

Summer visitor. Breeding. Localised.

Breeding territories occupied in Strabane, Sannox, Auchencar and Kilpatrick with up to 20 tunnels being used in Sannox on 9 June. Groups included 3 at Strabane on 11 April, 25 in Sannox bay on 14 April, 7 in Kilpatrick on 24 April and 2 in Pirnmill on 9 August.

Swallow (Barn Swallow) Hirundo rustica

Summer visitor. Breeding. Widespread.

Twenty occupied nests in Kilpatrick on 14 August. Groups included 30 in Brodick Country Park on 13 May, 30 in Catacol on 20 May, 100 at Balmichael on 10 August and 300 over High Kildonan on 9 September. Last one Kildonan on 21 October.

House Martin Delichon urbica

Summer visitor. Breeding. Widespread.

Numbers of occupied nests included 16 at Corriecravie from 18 April to 8 September, some had second broods. Groups included 30 in Catacol on 20 May, 18 by Corriecravie ponds on 8 July, 30 in Lamlash on 19 August and 10 over Port-na-Lochan pond on 24 October.

Tree Pipit Anthus trivialis

Scarce summer visitor, possibly underreported. No breeding records.

Singles at Dyemill on 29 April, in Brodick Country Park on 1 and 15 May, above Corrie on 4 June and in North Glen Sannox on 14 June. These are all the records for 2007.

Meadow Pipit Anthus pratensis

Resident. Breeding. Widespread.

Nest with four eggs Loch na Davie 25 June. Groups included 50 on Cleats Shore on 21 September and 40 on Kildonan shore on 7 October.

Rock Pipit Anthus petrosus

Resident. Breeding. Widespread along the coast.

Adults with small young at Kildonan on 1 June. Pair carrying food Kilpatrick on 10 June. Groups included 24 on Blackwaterfoot shore on 20 January and 6 at Clauchlands on 14 August.

Yellow Wagtail Motacilla flava

Scarce passage migrant.

No records for 2007. Last record two Cleats Shore on 23 April 2006.

Grey Wagtail Motacilla cinerea

Resident. Breeding. Localised.

Pair carrying food at Auchenhew on 28 May and at South Feorline on 30 May. Family of 4 at Port-na-Lochan and in Blackwaterfoot on 17 June. Other groups included 3 in Lamlash on 19 August and 2 South Feorline on 11 November.

Pied Wagtail Motacilla alba yarrellii

Resident. Breeding. Widespread.

Family of 6 in Blackwaterfoot on 7 June and family of 4 Machrie Golf Course 6 August. Groups included 16 at Blackwaterfoot on 20 January and 22 at Kildonan on 19 August.

White Wagtail Montacilla alba

Passage migrant.

Groups included 3 Cleats Shore on 12 April, 10 Kildonan shore on 15 April, 3 Corriecravie on 26 August and 16 Kildonan shore on 28 August, as well as groups passing south along Machrie shore throughout September.

Waxwing (Bohemian Waxwing) Bombycilla garrulus

Irruptive winter visitor in varying numbers; not seen every year.

Singles in Lamlash on 8 January, Kings Cross on 26 January, and Clauchlands on 31 January. These are all the records for 2007.

Dipper (White-throated Dipper) Cinclus cinclus

Resident. Breeding. Widespread.

Pairs recorded at Rosa, Monamore, Ben Lister and Ashdale burns. Also pairs at Slidderywater, Machriewater and Lochranza with juveniles reported from Sliddery on 27 May and Clauchan Water on 15 June. Tend to move towards coast in winter.

Wren Troglodytes troglodytes

Common resident. Breeding. Widespread.

Records from varied habitats through out the island. Groups included 2 adults with 6 young in Blackwaterfoot on 6 July.

Dunnock (Hedge Accentor) Prunella modularis

Common resident. Breeding. Widespread.

Pair carrying food in Merkland Wood on 28 May and a second brood fledged in Pirnmill on 29 June.

Robin (European Robin) Erithacus rubecula

Common resident. Breeding. Widespread.

Three fledged young at High Kildonan on 24 May, one fledged young in Kilpatrick on 14 June and 3 fledged young in Sannox on 28 June. Group of 5 in Shiskine on 24 October.

Black Redstart Phoenicurus ochruros

Scarce passage migrant.

No records for 2007. Last record a juvenile on Blackwaterfoot shore on 8 November 2006.

Redstart (Common Redstart) Phoenicurus phoenicurus

Scarce summer visitor, possibly underreported. Previously bred.

A female was caught and ringed at Porta Leacach, Kildonan, on 17 June. It had a brood patch. There had been no records for 2006.

Whinchat Saxicola rubetra

Summer visitor. Breeding. Localised.

Pairs and singles recorded Glen Righ, Machrie Moor, Glen Rosa, Lochranza, Kilmory, Ross Road, Auchenhew and Laggan.

Stonechat Saxicola torquata

Resident. Breeding. Widespread.

Sightings included a pair on Shiskine Golf course on 21 January, a nest with 5 eggs in Lamlash on 8 May, a family of 4 by Coire Fhionn Lochan on 17 June, 12 including juveniles in Glen Rosa on 28 August and a pair on Machrie Moor on 16 December.

Wheatear (Northern Wheatear) Oenanthe oenanthe

Summer visitor and passage migrant. Breeding. Widespread.

First reported: a male at Corriecravie ponds on 14 March. Pair with fledged young at Moss Farm on 21 May. Six including young at Kilpatrick on 3 July. On passage, two "Greenland" Wheatears ringed at Auchenhew Bay on 26 May.

Ring Ouzel Turdus torquatus

Scarce summer visitor, possibly underreported.

No records for 2007. Last record a single bird calling east side of Cir Mhor 9 June 2006.

Blackbird (Common Blackbird) Turdus merula

Common resident. Breeding. Widespread.

Pairs reported from all villages. Large groups included 18 in a Kilmory garden feeding in seaweed mulch on 13 November and 14 in Whiting Bay on 17 December.

Fieldfare Turdus pilaris

Winter visitor with records from January to April and October to November.

Groups, sometimes with Redwings, included 80 in Kilpatrick on 22 January, 50 in Machrie on 26 January, 150 at Dyemill on 21 October, and 300 by Slidderywater on 3 November.

Song Thrush Turdus philomelos

Common resident. Breeding. Widespread.

Pairs reported from all villages. Largest group 6 at Auchenhew bay on 26 April.

Redwing Turdus iliacus

Winter visitor with records from February to March and November to December.

Groups, sometimes with Fieldfares included 100 in Shiskine on 25 March, 300 High Kildonan on 18 October and 75 in Corrie on 20 October.

Mistle Thrush Turdus viscivorus

Resident. Breeding. Widespread.

Pair with 3 fledged young Aucheleffan. A group of 12 Auchareoch on 13 August.

Grasshopper Warbler (Common Grasshopper Warbler) Locustella naevia

Summer visitor. Breeding. Localised. Records from April to July.

Records included one reeling at Kilmory from 30 April, one Glen Righ on 30 April, two Auchenhew on 3 May, one Glenscorrodale on 21 May and one Machrie Moor on 21 May.

Sedge Warbler Acrocephalus schoenobaenus

Summer visitor. Breeding. Widespread. Records from April to August.

Records included 3 singing Corriecravie on 2 May, 3 pairs Auchenhew bay on 14 May, 2 at Port-na-Lochan on 20 May and one at Pirnmill on 9 August.

Lesser Whitethroat Sylvia curruca

Scarce summer visitor. No breeding records.

The only record for 2007 was one at Auchenhew Bay on 2 May (MHD).

Whitethroat (Common Whitethroat) Sylvia communis

Summer visitor. Breeding. Widespread. Records from April to August.

Pairs feeding young at Port-na-Lochan on 3 June, Cleats Shore on 14 August and at Clauchlands on 20 August. Other records included a male in Kildonan on 14 April, 4 Kilmory on 18 May and 2 Corriecravie on 8 July.

Garden Warbler Sylvia borin

Scarce summer visitor, possibly underreported.

One at Knockenkelly on 26 April, one Brodick Country Park on 26 April, one in Merkland Wood on 28 May and one in Machrie on 15 August. These are all the records for 2007.

Blackcap Sylvia atricapilla

Summer visitor and winter visitor. Breeding. Widespread.

Records included male in Whiting Bay on 18 January, a male at garden feeder in Brodick on 11 February, 3 singing in Glenashdale on 7 June and 2 juveniles at Porta Leacach on 17 June.

Yellow-browed Warbler Phylloscopus inornatus

Very rare and irregular passage migrant.

The only record for 2007 was one in Whiting Bay from 4 to 6 December (MHD).

Wood Warbler Phylloscopus sibilatrix

Summer visitor. Breeding. Localised Records from May to June.

With the exception of one singing in Glenashdale on 7 June, all records were from Merkland Wood where there were sightings between 28 April and 6 June.

Chiffchaff (Common Chiffchaff) Phylloscopus collybita

Summer visitor. Breeding. Localised. Records from March to August.

Records included one Brodick Country Park 25 March, one Knockenkelly 27 March, one Sliddery 27 March, one Kilpatrick 28 March, one Whiting Bay 5 April and one High Kildonan on 13 August.

Willow Warbler Phylloscopus trochilus

Summer visitor. Breeding. Widespread. Records from April to August.

Records included one Glen Righ 11 April, one Glen Cloy 14 April, one Clauchlands 20 April, one Cladach 26 April, one juvenile Kilpatrick 12 July and one Sliddery 20 August.

Goldcrest Regulus regulus

Common resident. Breeding. Widespread.

Groups included 3 Brodick Country Park 25 September, 5 Milburn Wood 19 October, 3 Machrie Wood 15 November and 7 Glen Rosa 25 November.



Firecrest Regulus ignicapillus

Very rare and irregular passage migrant.

The only record for 2007 was one in Whiting Bay on 17 November (MW)

Spotted Flycatcher Muscicapa striata

Summer visitor. Breeding. Localised. Records from May to August.

Nest with 2 young Pirnmill 7 July, 2 young Kilmory 6 August, and 2 young Sliddery 20 August. Other records included 2 Brodick Country Park 1 May, 3 Glenashdale 20 May and 2 Merkland Wood 28 May.

Pied Flycatcher Ficedula hypoleuca

Irregular summer visitor.

No records for 2007. Last record one on Newton Shore on 28 April 1998.

Long-tailed Tit Aegithalos caudatus

Resident. Breeding. Widespread.

Records included 14 Brodick 16 January, 10 South Feorline 23 May, 10 Sannox 24 May, 16 Whiting Bay 6 June, 30 Doonan 30 August and 18 Corriegills 28 October.

Willow Tit Parus montanus

Rare vagrant.

No records for 2007. Last record one North Sannox on 13 May 2004.

Coal Tit Parus ater

Common resident. Breeding. Widespread.

Reports from all villages of birds visiting garden feeders. Largest group was 9 in Glenashdale on 9 December.

Blue Tit Parus caeruleus

Common resident. Breeding. Widespread.

Reports from all villages of birds visiting garden feeders. Seven young Sliddery 3 June, 3 young Whiting Bay 6 June, 2 young Kilpatrick 24 June and 4 young Pirnmill 29 June.

Great Tit Parus major

Common resident. Breeding. Widespread.

Reports from all villages of birds visiting garden feeders. Two young Auchrannie 26 May, 3 young Kilpatrick 15 June and 4 young Pirnmill on 29 June.

Nuthatch (Wood Nuthatch) Sitta europea

Rare vagrant.

No records for 2007. Last record one Corrie on 25 June 2002.

Treecreeper (Eurasian Treecreeper) Certhia familiaris

Resident. Breeding. Widespread.

Family group of 5 in Glenashdale on 20 May. Other records of single birds included Cladach 18 January, Whitehouse Wood 2 April, Merkland Wood 11 April, Pirnmill 28 May and Porta Leacach 1 July.

Golden Oriole Oriolus oriolus

Rare vagrant.

No records for 2007. Last record a female in Lochranza on 7 June 1979.

Red-backed Shrike Lanius collurio

Rare vagrant.

No records for 2007. Last record a male at Kildonan on 27 September 1997.



Great Grey shrike Lanius excubiter

Rare vagrant.

The only record for 2007 was one in Fairy Glen, Lochranza, on 24 October (PAH).

Jay (Eurasian Jay) Garrulus glandarius

Rare vagrant.

No records for 2007. Last record one Brodick Country Park on 24 October 1985.

Magpie (Black-billed Magpie) Pica pica

Vagrant. Only seven records in last twenty five years.

No records for 2007. Last record one Corriecravie ponds on 9 December 2006.

Chough *Pyrrhocorax pyrrhocorax*

Rare vagrant. Previously bred.

No records for 2007. Last record 5 in Lochranza on 5 July 2001.

Jackdaw (Eurasian Jackdaw) Corvus monedula

Common resident. Breeding. Widespread.

Groups included 120 Drumadoon on 21 January, 75 Kildonan on 27 January, 50 Pirnmill on 10 February and 64 Machriewaterfoot on 21 March.

Rook Corvus frugilegus

Winter visitor.

Groups included 6 Lamlash on 6 January, 2 adults and 2 fledged young Shiskine on 20 June, 13 Kilpatrick on 3 July, 5 South Feorline on 18 October and 8 Corriecravie on 18 November.

Carrion Crow Corvus corone: Hooded Crow Corvus cornix

Both species including intermediates are common residents. Breeding. Widespread.

Groups included 30 Cleat's Shore on 16 January, 40 Shiskine on 4 February and 120 Lamlash on 7 February.

Raven (Common Raven) Corvus corax

Common resident. Breeding. Widespread.

Pairs at Brown Head on 8 March, Dun Fionn on 14 March, Glen Chalmadale on 14 March, Corriecravie on 4 May and Bennan Head on 10 May. Largest group 27 on the Ross Road on 24 April.

Rose-coloured Starling Sturnus roseus

Rare vagrant.

No records for 2007. Last record one adult in Brodick on 28 June 2002.

Starling (Common Starling) Sturnus vulgaris

Common resident. Breeding. Widespread.

Groups included 180 Kilpatrick on 18 February, 150 in Cosyden on 8 March, 300 Kilpatrick on 17 October and 200 South Feorline on 11 November.

House Sparrow Passer domesticus

Common resident. Breeding. Widespread.

Adults feeding 3 young in Shiskine on 21 May, 3 young in Machrie on 25 May and 2 young in Kilpatrick on 17 June (second brood). Groups included 9 Shiskine on 29 January, 15 Lamlash on 19 May, 5 Lochranza on 16 June, 25 Whiting Bay on 17 July, 100 Shiskine on 16 August and 38 Kilpatrick on 19 August.

Tree Sparrow (Eurasian Tree Sparrow) Passer montanus

Rare vagrant. Previously bred.

No records for 2007. Last record 2 in Brodick on 17 June 1997.

Chaffinch Fringilla coelebs

Common resident. Breeding. Widespread.

Two fledged young Kilpatrick 26 June. Groups included 30 Brodick Country Park on 15 May, 35 Shiskine on 22 October and 16 Whiting Bay on 17 December.

Brambling Fringilla montifringilla

Irruptive winter visitor in varying numbers; not seen every year.

Both from High Kildonan a male on 9 October and a female on 19 November. These are all the records for 2007.

Greenfinch (European Greenfinch) Carduelis chloris

Common resident. Breeding. Widespread.

Fledged young at garden feeders in Kildonan on 28 May, Kilpatrick on 29 May, and Sannox on 28 June. Groups included 30 Kildonan on 21 January, 12 Kilpatrick on 8 February, 30 High Kildonan on 22 February and 8 Corriecravie on 8 June.

Goldfinch (European Goldfinch) Carduelis carduelis

Resident. Breeding. Widespread.

Fledged young at garden feeders in Kilpatrick on 7 June and Blackwaterfoot on 15 June. Groups included 24 Corriecravie on 15 April, 15 Levencorrach on 17 May, 20 South Feorline on 24 September, 30 Lamlash on 29 September and 17 Auchareoch on 9 October.

Siskin (Eurasian Siskin) Carduelis spinus

Resident. Breeding. Widespread. Most records between January and June.

Fledged young at feeders High Kildonan on 6 May, Blackwaterfoot on 18 June and Kilpatrick on 19 June. Groups included 10 Kilpatrick on 1 February, 25 Glenashdale on 25 February, 15 Catacol on 21 September and 50 Dyemill on 10 October.

Linnet (Common Linnet) Carduelis cannabina

Resident. Breeding. Widespread. Most records between April and November.

Pair nest building Cleats Shore 6 April. Groups included 18 (7 young) Corriecravie on 8 July, 200 Cleats Shore on 24 September, 40 Drumadoon on 30 September and 50 Clauchlands on 26 November.

Twite Carduelis flavirostris

Resident. Breeding. Localised. Most records in spring and autumn.

No breeding records. Groups included 10 Cleats Shore on 22 September, 10 Drumadoon on 30 September, 30 Blackwaterfoot on 24 October and 100 Thunderguy shore also on 24 October.

Redpoll (Lesser Redpoll) Carduelis cabaret

Resident. Breeding. Localised. Most records in spring.

Records included one first winter in Kilpatrick from 1 to 4 February, 4 Kilmory on 17 May, family of 3 Kilpatrick on 2 July, 3 Imachar on 14 July, 6 Pirnmill on 9 August and 4 Machrie Moor on 29 September.

Crossbill (Common Crossbill) Loxia curvirostra

Resident. Breeding. Localised.

Pair feeding 2 fledged young Dyemill forest 15 March. Records included 3 at Home Farm, Brodick on 17 May, 8 Machrie on 17 July, 14 Corriegills on 8 October and 22 Kilmory on 6 November.

Scarlet Rosefinch (Common Rosefinch) *Carpodacus erythrinus Rare vagrant.*

No records for 2007. Last record one juvenile at High Kildonan on 24 October 1999.

Bullfinch (Common Bullfinch) Pyrrhula pyrrhula

Resident. Breeding. Localised.

Female with 5 juveniles Porta Leacach on 1 July. Groups included 12 Urie Loch on 12 January, 4 pairs Brodick on 28 June, 30 feeding on heather by Kilpatrick plantation on 5 February, pair Margnaheglish on 23 February, 23 Kilmory on 12 November and 15 Boguille on 17 December.

Hawfinch Coccothraustes coccothraustes

Rare vagrant.

No records for 2007. Last record one Margnaheglish on 26 April 2000.



Snow Bunting Plectrophenax nivalis

Varying numbers on passage and in winter.

Singles reported from Glen Catacol on 10 November, Casteal Abhail on 11 November and Meall Breac on 3 December. These are all the records for 2007.

Yellowhammer Emberiza citrinella

Resident. Breeding. Localised. Most records between January and April and in November and December.

No breeding records for 2007. Records included 4 males 2 females Shiskine on 19 January, a pair Roddin on 28 February, a pair Drumadoon on 30 September and a pair Shiskine on 11 November.

Reed Bunting Emberiza schoeniclus

Resident. Breeding. Localised.

Female with 2 fledged young Ross Road 27 June. Records included a pair Machrie pond on 14 April, a pair Clauchlands on 15 April, a pair Corriecravie on 2 May and 40 Drumadoon on 30 September.

Corn bunting Miliaria calandra

Rare vagrant. Previously bred.

No records for 2007. Last record 2 in Brodick area on 7 October 1984.

How to be a good birdwatcher

Some points to bear in mind.

- Welfare of birds must come first. Whether your particular interest is photography, ringing, sound recording, scientific study or just birdwatching, remember that the welfare of the bird must always come first.
- 2. **Habitat protection.** Its habitat is vital to a bird and therefore we must ensure that our activities do not cause damage.
- 3. Keep disturbance to a minimum. Birds' tolerance of disturbance varies between species and seasons. Therefore, it is safer to keep all disturbance to a minimum, particularly in the breeding season. No birds should be disturbed from the nest in case opportunities for predators to take eggs or young are increased. In very cold weather disturbance to birds may cause them to use vital energy at a time when food is difficult to find.
- 4. Rare breeding birds. If you discover a rare bird breeding and feel that protection is necessary, inform the local wildlife crime officer, PC Frazer Mitchell, telephone 01770 302574. Otherwise it is best in almost all circumstances to keep the record strictly secret in order to avoid disturbance by other birdwatchers and attacks by egg-collectors. Never visit known sites of rare breeding birds unless they are adequately protected. Even presence may give away the site to others and cause so many other visitors that the birds may fail to breed successfully. In terms of the Wildlife and Countryside Act (1981) and the Nature Conservation (Scotland) Act 2004 disturbance at or near the nests of birds is a criminal offence.
- 5. **Rare migrants.** Rare migrants or vagrants must not be harassed. If you discover one, consider the circumstances carefully before telling anyone. Will an influx of birdwatchers disturb the bird or others in the area? Will the habitat be damaged? Will problems be caused with the landowner?
- 6. **The Law.** The bird protection laws, as embodied in Wildlife and Countryside Act (1981) and the Nature Conservation (Scotland) Act 2004, are the result of hard campaigning by previous generations of birdwatchers. As birdwatchers, we must abide by them at all times and not allow them to fall into disrepute.
- 7. **Respect the rights of landowners.** The wishes of landowners and occupiers of land must be respected. Always follow the Scottish Access Code.
- 8. Respect the rights of other people. Have proper consideration for other birdwatchers. Try not to disrupt their activities or scare the birds they are watching. There are many other people who also use the countryside. Do not interfere with their activities and, if it seems that what they are doing is causing unnecessary disturbance to birds, do try to take a balanced view. While flushing gulls when walking a dog on a beach in winter may do little harm, in the breeding season, the same dog would be a serious disturbance to nesting shore birds or a nesting gull colony. When pointing this out to a non-birdwatcher, be courteous, but firm. The non-birdwatchers' goodwill towards birds must not be destroyed by the attitudes of birdwatchers.
- Keeping records. Much of today's knowledge about birds is the result of meticulous record keeping by our predecessors. Make sure you help to add to tomorrow's knowledge by sending records to your local recorder.
